Red Cross Airplane

This airplane is in the Pima County Air Museum out on Valencia Road. There was a time when a prophet saw something flying in the air very high that made him think of an eagle. It says something about, "We shall be brought home on the wings of eagles." Israel became a nation in 1946. In the early 1950's, the Jewish people in Yemen wanted to go home to Israel. Thirty thousand of them walked out into the desert and sat down and said, "We want to go to Jerusalem." They had been in Yemen for over 500 years. They were third class citizens. They could not stand if an Arab was sitting. They didn't even know how to climb stairs; they'd never been any higher off the ground than a donkey's back. When they were sitting out in the desert, saying, "Next year Jerusalem, and we want to go home now," they did not know the United Nations had declared Israel to be a nation. The government of Yemen has a problem: "What will we do with all these people?" They contacted the United Nations, who contacted America, who contacted the Red Cross who sent airplanes over there to fly those people home.



When these people saw the airplanes, they would not get on them until a rabbi opened the scroll and said, "Did not the prophet say we would be taken home on the wings of eagles?" When the prophet wrote about it, he saw it as eagles. But when it was fulfilled, it was an airplane. This airplane, which was purchased by the Shell Oil Company and donated as a gift to the Pima Air Museum, is here for a purpose: For you and I to understand the simplicity that when a prophet says something, it's the word of God, but when it comes to pass it is the fulfillment of that word. This airplane is the fulfillment of a prophecy.
